Business duo root for the town centre

When vandals destroyed five young apple trees in Stroud, two local businesspeople decided the town shouldn't miss out.

Helen Brent-Smith and Dave Kaspar donated five trees to the Town Council.

The couple are well known at Stroud Farmers' Market for their Day's Cottage organic apple juice, cider and perry. They also grow fruit trees to sell and have donated saplings to replace the vandalised trees.

The trees are rare single varieties from the county including: Siddington Russet, Gloucester Costard and Hunt's Duke of Gloucester.

"We are replacing the apple trees that were damaged by vandals because we know how much the people of Stroud enjoyed the blossom and then watching the fruit form," said Helen and Dave.

Pledge your support to safeguard the Subs

he Town Council has launched a campaign to raise £100,000 in pledges to carry out improvements to the Sub Rooms and ensure its future as a community-owned venue.

The fundraising initiative is part of the Town Council's proposal to Stroud District Council to take on a lease of the venue.

"For the moment we are simply asking people to make a pledge to demonstrate to the District Council that there is wide-ranging community support to create a viable and vibrant cultural and arts centre," said Town Mayor Kevin Cranston.

"During the past 12 months thousands of people have called for the Subs Rooms to be kept in public ownership.

"If our offer to Stroud District Council is successful we will launch a detailed plan for the future of the Subs at which time we'll be looking for vital early donations as we get up and

The money would be used to improve the toilets and provide a new bar and cafe. These improvements were highlighted by people who completed a recent Town Council survey.

"The majority of the more than 600 people

who completed the survey stated that these improvements would make a real difference to the Subs and would thus help us bring in more income," said Councillor Cranston.

Among the first to support the Subs Pledge campaign is Stroud author Katie Fforde.

"'The Sub Rooms was one of the first buildings we saw when we came house hunting in Stroud 38 years ago," said Katie.

"I imagined people saving up their pennies and paying to have it built. It is essential that it stays there for the people of Stroud. It is part of all our lives now."

We're here to help, whatever your problem

Citizens Advice Stroud & Cotswold Districts is a local charity that is there to help everyone, whatever their problem.

Based in Brunel Mall, the charity runs drop-in clinics every Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 10am to 1.45pm with appointments outside of these times.

There is also a free helpline - 0808 800 0510 Monday to Friday 10am - 4pm.

Citizens Advice receives £5,000 a year from the Town Council, money that the charity says is vital for its survival.

"We receive no national funding so regular support, like that of Stroud Town Council, means we can keep the service going," says Sally Pickering, Chief Officer.

Most of the enquiries dealt with by the 12 staff and 80 volunteers are about money and the advice given focuses on enabling

people to maximise their income and minimise their debts.

They also provide independent advice and information on such issues as housing, employment, probate and wills, divorce, benefits and appeals, consumer problems and elderly care planning.

"Everyone has a point in their lives when they are faced with a situation that they've never had to deal with before and they don't know how to navigate their way through it. Citizens Advice is the only place that provides free, impartial, independent and confidential advice on any issue, whatever it is," said Sally.

Council tax precept to rise by 24p per week

The Town Council has increased its share of the council tax by 24p per week for the average Band D payer. In 2018-19, an average Band D council tax payer will pay £144.58 an increase of 24p per week.

The increase will help the Town Council with its increased community responsibilities.

The Town Council owns Lansdown Hall. It is responsible for 20 green spaces and play areas in the town and manages five allotment sites, the town clock and floral displays.

The Town Council also provides grants and long-term financial support to community organisations including the Citizens Advice Bureau, Marah Trust, Allsorts and youth activities and play schemes.

Mother Nature needs your support

Volunteers are needed to help preserve the town's old cemetery in Old Bisley Road, which is one of only a handful in the country that is classified as a nature reserve.

Award categories

Young Person of the Year: for people under the age of 25 who have contributed to culture and the arts, sports, community life or the environment.

Environmental Awards: for action to enhance the environment or improve awareness of sustainability issues.

Trade Award: for people who work in or run any shop, café, restaurant or other business in the parish of Stroud, not just the town centre.

Community Award: for a group or individuals who have gone that extra mile to improve community life.

Working together to improve rail station

More trees, a link from the station down to the canal and a community piano are just some of the suggestions from people on how to make Stroud's railway station area more welcoming.

About 50 residents and business

owners attended a consultation event to hear about a range of potential improvements across the whole station area, including the forecourt, approach roads and car parks.

The station area was one of the areas highlighted during consultations for the Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP).

As a result, the Town Council is working with Integrated Transport Planning to create

a long-term masterplan for Stroud Station. The proposal has been shaped by research and opinions gathered over several months of consultation.

The Town Council will now move forward with consultations with Network Rail, GWR, Stroud District Council and Gloucestershire County Council Highways. A more in-depth public consultation will be staged later in the year.



Roundabout puts children in a spin

Children are enjoying new play equipment, thanks to the teamwork of parents and the Town Council.

The latest addition to the play area at Daisy Bank include a roundabout and new flat swings. It is the result of a long-term consultation process

between parents, children and the Town Council.

"Everything we have done the Town Council has fully supported us. It's a great dialogue and the play area is really popular with the children," said Hayley Shortt, chairperson of the Friends of Daisy Bank.

Monty Roberts has given the new roundabout his seal of approval. "The roundabout is great and quite a lot of people come here when the weather is good," said the eight-year-old.

We're declaring war on plastic

he Town Council and Transition Stroud have joined forces to keep the town topped up with water - and cut the use of plastic.

They are working together to ensure that people in Stroud can easily refill their reusable water bottles for free.

The Town Council has agreed to pay for the licence to enable Stroud to join the national Refill app scheme which lists all the places people can refill for free.

Participating cafes, bars, restaurants, banks, galleries, museums and other businesses simply put a sticker in their window – alerting passers-by to the fact they're welcome to come on in and fill up their bottle – for free.

The Town Council is funding the installation of a drinking-water fountain for Bank Gardens. The project is in the planning stages and the Council has earmarked £3,500 for the purchase and installation of the fountain and for the refill project.

Transition Stroud launched the Stroud Valleys Action on Plastic campaign last year.

When the Town Council, which has also been researching ways to cut plastic usage in Stroud,

learned about the campaign the organisations decided to join forces.

Transition Stroud is appealing for volunteers who can help talk to businesses, cafes and shops about the refill scheme.

"The Stroud Valleys Action on Plastic was formed under the umbrella of Transition Stroud with the aim of helping the town, local businesses and individuals to reduce the use of single-use plastic," said Claudia Williams from Transition Stroud.

Campaign to slow traffic

New vehicle-activated speed signs will be installed in Stroud this Spring.

The Town Council launched the road safety campaign after receiving a grant from the Gloucestershire Police and Crime Commissioner for the signs.

The campaign stalled when it was discovered - 12 months later - that the lampposts in the town were not strong enough to hold the signs.

Now Gloucestershire Highways has agreed to fund and install specific posts for the signs.

Saving lives

The Town Council is working with the Community Heartbeat Trust and the District Council to install four defibrillators in the parish.

It follows an appeal from businesses, the public and street pastors to install the life-saving machines. So far, Stroud Rotary Club and HSBC Bank have pledged towards the cost of the project.

The Council's Green Spaces team will check the machines weekly and ensure they are in working order.


