## **Description**

Victorian three-storey, three bay house built principally of brick, but with decorative rounded stone arches above the windows on the ground and first floors. "Chedworth House" engraved in stone either side of central first floor window. Original scraper to left of front door. Part of the first phase of development of the north side of Lansdown (from the Greyhound to Locking Hill), which started in 1867 (architect: William Clissold). Although Chedworth House is a handsome Victorian building in its own right, it is of social interest as a diary exists of a 14-year- old boy whose family, the Randells, were the first inhabitants of the house. 'A Cotswold Diary' by Alfred Luke Randell, aged 14, describes life in Stroud at that time – he was already working. Alfred's father was Geoffrey Randall, the High Bailiff of Stroud County Court, an accountant and a Methodist preacher.

Architectural and aesthetic value	Handsome 19 <sup>th</sup> century building, part of William Clissold's development of Lansdown from 1867.
Evidential value	Associated with Alfred Randell, one of the first inhabitants of Chedworth House. He wrote a diary, A Cotswold Diary. A transcription of the diary of Alfred Luke Randell, of Lansdown, Stroud, in the County of Gloucestershire, master cabinetmaker, linguist and European traveller, 1869-1876, by his grandson, Alfred Hollis Randell.
